Mrs. Anaxi H. Shah founded SMILE in May 1997. She completed her Bachelor of Arts from Wilson College in 1971 and Master of Social work from Nirmala Niketan College in 1973.

She has 43 years of work experience in her field of expertise. She has worked as a medical social worker at J.J Hospital, with orphans, mentally retarded children at Jairajbhoy Pirbhoy Orphanage and with needy families at the Family Welfare Centre at the Jain Mahila Samaj. She was also a staff project officer at Nirmala Niketan College of Social Work for Vatsalaya, a project dedicated to street and slum children.

Apart from the above, Mrs. Anaxi has written and directed a film titled 'Asli Shaher' which depicts issues related to the street children who have run away from their homes.

She is also a director of 'Butterflies' which is a one year training program for those who want to do social work with the right methodology and knowledge. Not only is she a counsellor for women and children, she is also a resource person and consultant to various NGO's.

A voice from the heart

With a heart filled with humility and gratitude and eyes brimming with beautiful dreams, is how I feel as I look back on our 20 year journey of "Street to Success."

It all started when Sri Gunwant Sheth took notice of my work with children on the street near Chowpatty beach. To aid my efforts, he immediately offered me a place in the public garden at Babulnath and a day care center. This helped me crystallize my dreams of improving the lives of these idle and forgotten children through sustainable education and an all round personality development. This further helped me formalize a structured course using non-formal and therapeutic methodology of teaching to keep these children interested and excited to come to our center without having to feel like an outsider.

This is when NDTV stepped in and helped us re-do the interiors of the center and made it very pleasant & attractive. Mr. Pratap & Mrs. Rashmi Parekh gave us an administrative office at Malabar hill which laid a very strong foundation for SMILE. Eventually we shifted out to our present office, which was generously given by Shri Vallabhbhai Bhansali whose faith in our vision fired us with a missionary zeal!

Our journey since then has been fulfilled with the large hearted support of innumerable individual sponsors. We remain ever obliged to Trent India Ltd, Concern India Foundation, Amada Trust and Tata Communication who extended their support at a critical time further empowering and strengthening our objective.

SMILE has over the years evolved the unique technique

of individual follow up, timely mentoring and family counseling. Children are further attended to, keeping in mind their economic and socio-psycho background. This creates an emotional connect and motivates the child to pursue education and participate in extracurricular activities. The Nutrition Program, daily tuitions and weekly dance classes by Shiamak Davar, kathak & karate have immensely benefitted in making the children healthy, confident and aware of their talents and skills.

Right from its inception, SMILE has single mindedly aimed at reaching the goal where our children possess well-rounded personality, education and skills and the women develop a higher self-esteem, and are financially independent as well as confident.

Today, after 20 years I proudly yet humbly present the benchmarks achieved by SMILE in this daunting yet beautiful journey of providing education to children and make them confident, responsible and independent citizens of India.

Today 15 of our children are educated & financially independent. 62 children have completed HSC levels and are making their mark in various Bachelor level programs in engineering, medicine and other streams of arts, commerce and science. More than 2000 children in metro and rural schools are now attending school under the umbrella of SMILE.

We are still very young and our journey has only just begun.

About SMILE

SMILE was initiated in 1997 with the primary objective of giving an education to the poorer section of society.

We started our project by reaching out to children wandering aimlessly at Chowpatty beach and on the streets begging at traffic signals and brought them under our day care centre. Gradually over the years, we started extending our work to children in need of financial support at government aided schools and with school dropouts.

Using our specific formed methodology and therapeutic media, we successfully put the children from non-formal education into schools. We constantly worked with these kids and helped them cross the hurdles they encountered along the way. We encouraged them with their academics and helped develop their personalities and nurtured their talents. We also provided them learning resources and an exposure through educational visits, extra-curricular activities as well as group tuitions. This is how project 'Udaan' came to life.

Seeing the progress of our children with their successful results and achievements, SMILE began extending it's work to children from the schedule caste and schedule tribe. SMILE adopted a few schools in the rural areas of Maharashtra and Gujrat. This gave birth to our 'Rural project.'

SMILE further conducted a survey in the slum areas of Mumbai and found that children weren't being sent to

school till the age of 5 years, which are the most formative years of development in a child. This is how SMILE started project 'Montessori.'

Along the way we realized that it was important to work with the parents of these children especially the mother's. Which is when our project 'Utkarsh' came into existence.

SMILE started educating these women, helped them understand the importance of education for their kids and gave them an understanding of a good parent-child relationship. We worked towards the upliftment of these women through various educational and personality grooming workshops. SMILE also provided them with the entertainment that they lacked. These women came with many talents which resulted in SMILE helping them build on these skills further. This is how we began the 'Income Generation Project' for our Utkarsh women. Our women grew confident and developed their own identities, which led them to earning a sustainable income for their families and themselves.

'Umang', is our senior citizen project that was launched in 1999. We provided our family of elderly citizens entertainment, outings, organized various programs and helped create a group of strongly knit friends who they could share their thoughts and feelings with. SMILE now helps out with any issues these senior citizens face and continue to help out with old age homes assisting with outings and entertainment.

SMILE is a registered non-governmental organization that is reaching out to children from the lower sections of society and gives them an education, exposure, resources and a career enabling them to be financially independent and thereby uplifting an entire family.

Our Objective

We eventually make them independent and self-reliant by providing educational support, vocational courses and many other training programs.

Honorary Visit


It was indeed a moment of pride for everyone at SMILE when Late Dr. Abdul Kalam our former President visited SMILE in 2011.


He learned about SMILE's involvement with rural schools and since it aligned with his interest of helping education in rural India he made a visit to SMILE.

The royal couple spent some time with our Utkarsh women and our children through an interactive session to know each one of them. The couple visited the community area of our families where our women showcased their talents and products they had made. **Prince William also spoke to all the school children and asked them about their favorite subjects and how they are able to excel in school. Every child proudly said they were very well encouraged and supported by SMILE.**

In the dusty square, the couple played football with our children. Residents from the locality sought vantage points from upstairs windows and ledges. The couple met some of SMILE's success stories. One of them was Siddhesh Tirloskar who was challenged by Prince William for his dance moves. Eventually Prince William had to give up on Siddhesh's flip-flop moves!

The hour and a half that the Royal couple spent with our SMILE family was a lifelong memory etched in our hearts. No words could have described what the children and representatives of SMILE had gone through that day. It was indeed a dream come true.

2002

- The sponsorship program for our children was launched.
- SMILE Montessori was started for children from 2 to 5 years.

2003

'Young at heart' was a Christmas Carnival organized for our senior citizens of SMILE.

2004

Mumbai Disaster relief - SMILE helped the citizens of Mumbai affected by the terrible floods that hit our city. Our volunteers helped out with food, ration, medicines and school books.

2005



Value education project launched. Personality development classes conducted with the children from B.K.M High school.

2006

An informative talk was held for our Utkarsh women by the chief manager of State Bank of India on banking and saving.

2007

- The first rural project at Panwal village in Ratnagiri was started. A school was restructured and upgraded here.
- SMILE for every mile - a project that was extended to senior citizens and an outing was organized for them.

2008



SMILE extended its hand to senior citizens at J.J Dharamshala. SMILE also connected with various homes for the aged to include them into their programs.

2009

Sponsoring of children from both Scheduled caste and Schedule tribe from two South Mumbai schools was organised.

2010

We were honoured by Late Dr. Abdul Kalam's visit at SMILE.

2011

SMILE organized a Republic day program with Shri Mangal Prabhatji Lodha in Mumbai. The children and women of SMILE took part in this patriotic parade.

2012

- NDTV chose SMILE as one of the many N.G.O's to support and gave the centre a new look.
- An e-education program was launched in nine schools in Maharashtra and four in Gujarat.
- Montessori school in Panwal village started. Schools in Gandhinagar adopted by SMILE.

2013

- DMIT (Dermatoglyphics Multiple Intelligence Test) is a brain mapping technique. SMILE started conducting these tests for the children to help them tap into their talents.
- SMILE adopted a rural school in Wada, Thane.

2014

An Anaemia camp, 'Iron ki shakti' was conducted for the girls of SMILE to test them on iron deficiency. They were educated on how to take care of this issue and supplements were provided to them.

2015

- SMILE was chosen as one of the N.G.O's by the High Commissioner of The British Council in Mumbai. His Highness Prince William and Kate from England visited SMILE.

Education of a child is the foundation for a better future

Project Udaan began in 1997 with a handful of street & slum children. These children were wandering aimlessly and had not been exposed to any form of education.

The idea was to attract these children to come to our Udaan centre by way of games, story-telling using various educational media. We slowly created an interest in them to be educated & having understood the importance of education, the passion for being able to read & write was ignited in them.

These children come from extremely lower income groups and their parents are illiterate or have limited elementary education and are not able to guide them. The parents live with only one dream of giving a good education to their children so as to ensure a better future for them. Their expectations from their children are high because of the hard work they are putting in to provide an education for them.

In order to give the child a support system that they are lacking in their environment, SMILE launched the sponsorship programme in 1998 and extended support to the child by way of tuition classes, educational workshops, expert talks, dance, art and craft.

The sponsorship programme supports the child in all ways to overcome his socio-economic hurdles, making them into confident individuals. SMILE has touched the lives of 3500 children from urban and rural schools.

Throughout the year SMILE organises various educational, entertainment, competitions, programmes and festivals to give exposure to these children. Our children are good at dramatics, dance, organising cultural programmes themselves and comparing them too. **So these children develop, leadership skills, communication skills and self-confidence.**

Udaan Programmes during 2016-2017

Throughout the year SMILE organized various educational, cultural and entertainment programs for the children and also encouraged them to participate in sports, competitions, educational programs and outings sponsored by various corporates and organizations.

This give them exposure and opportunity to develop their personality and build their confidence.



An Educational Workshop

Brain Power and Concentration by EduBay Team:

Representatives from EduBay team had come to SMILE for three consecutive Saturdays to deliver an educational workshop for our children. Each Saturday the topic and method differed from the other.

Week 1

For the first few weeks, the children were introduced to themselves in a very creative and a fun way. They were asked to trace the palm on the paper and represent each of the fingers as one of the promises they would make to themselves. Children came with promises like "I will study hard", "I will always help my friends", "and I will respect my parents" etc. Each child learnt a lesson and a way of improving for themselves. They were later on divided into teams and a game of dumb charades was played where the theme was career options. Children came using different props to demonstrate different careers. Each group came with innovative ways to display the career.


In the end, the groups were retained and children had to make a roadmap of what they wish to do in their academic path. They had to draw their goals and ways to achieve them. Besides, as a team what message does the entire team believe in. We had messages like helping poor, save water, save animals etc.



Week 2

The topic for this week was Team Building. The topic was beautifully taught through various mechanisms. One of them included dividing the group between girls and boys. Two girls had to get tangled and the rest had to entangle the circle without leaving the hands. Through this example and quoting the example of a car and its various parts, they were taught that the car can function only when all the parts come together. Individually the car cannot work by itself. Hence the lesson taught was that for effective team work: a) Co-ordination b) Unity c) Communication d) Leadership.

Each of these was displayed individually through an activity. The children were divided in groups and each of them had to display each of the requirements for team building. Here the example of fresh lime water was taken. Except for the communication team, nobody was allowed to talk. Each of the team had to mime the ingredients of lime water. Most of them could do it effectively. It was later quoted that lime water cannot have any of its ingredients missing to make it a tasty one.



Week 3

The subject for this week was Concentration. To teach this, a small memory game was played where the student had to memorize the name of the fruits previously spoken by others and add one more to the chain. The last student has to repeat all the fruit names in the correct order. Later the crowd was divided into two teams. Members of one team were to work on a code language individually and the second team was asked to work on a code language collectively. Since the second team worked together they made a lot of noise. This did not affect the working of members of the first team. Through this activity the kids were later asked what they did to concentrate despite many disturbances. Some internal factors discussed were stress, subject interest, teacher, difficulty level etc. Some external factors included mobile, language, friends, television, games etc.

Before parting, the students were taught the concept of SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis of themselves and refer to them every time in a difficult situation.



Spelling Game

If you were to ask kids to name their most hated subject, most of them would say spelling, surprisingly not math. Many children struggle with their spelling words and often loose marks in examinations only for spelling mistakes.

Hence we thought; why not make this process a learning one. We organized a game for all our children where they were divided into four groups based on their standards. We distributed individual alphabets to each team and asked them to collect all the alphabets to make the spelling of the word announced. Children ran around with their alphabets to make the spelling correct. Surprisingly, most of the students were super excited about the game and got accurate spellings 9 out of 10 times.



Rakshabandhan and Janmashtami

Rakhi, as they say is sacred thread of protection embellished with the love and affection of a sister for her brother. To mark this bond, the entire nation celebrates Rakshabandhan with zest. Every year we continue to perform the rituals associated with the festival to bring out its importance. This year, after the rituals we had small role-plays depicting the brother-sister bond.

Janmashtami is one of the most vibrant festival and is celebrated in honour of the birth of one of the most loved deities; Lord Krishna. We spoke to the children about its importance followed by a fun depiction of the same through three role-plays.



Diwali

The festival of light that symbolizes victory of good over evil is celebrated at SMILE with the same happiness as it is in the entire nation. This program has always been a festival where the children and their parents enjoy together. We have games for parents, different ones for the children too. A light session of humor is kept to let loose all the tension. The children this year were given a gift box containing Dairy milk, Kitkat, Gems, Perk and butter cookies; and a Hygienic kit (chocolates, biscuits, Colgate, bandages, brush, comb, handkerchief, life boy soap, nail cutter, etc). The ladies received dry fruits and ration. As winners of games they took back jewelry, jewelry boxes and purse as prizes.



Stress Buster Party

As a yearly ritual to relieve our students of the exam stress, we organize a Stress buster party; this is organized by their parents. We had dance performance by our women and children. They also enacted a few skits and role-plays. An environment of smiles and giggles was created. At the end, books and bags were given to children and spices (half kg turmeric powder, one kg coriander powder, one and quarter kg hot mixture of spices) to all the women.



Childrens Day

Our professors this year decided that they would play a strong role in celebrating children's day and hence came up with five stories on Chacha Nehru from his childhood to old age. These stories were the scripts for the role-plays children performed. The children depicted Nehru's 1st birthday, his school life, his barrister days in London, how he met Gandhi, his contributions to the freedom struggle and how he got named Chacha Nehru.

Children indeed had a good time practicing for the role-plays and performing the same. At the end of the program they were treated to wholesome food and refreshments.

A Childrens Day Outing

To make Children's day even more special, we were called upon by the owner of Café Haqq se; Ms. Swapna Gupta for a scrumptious lunch treat. 34 of our children were given royal treatment at the tables of the restaurant. Two days prior to the treat, children were taught about not wasting food, keeping the decorum of the restaurant intact and maintain good discipline.

Each child displayed etiquette at the restaurant. Their tables were piled with a wide variety of food offerings from pizza, tandoori roti, paneer vegetable, cheese roll, gulab jamun, etc. Besides the food, the hospitality the staff and owner showed was impeccable. Since the restaurant had live music arrangement, all our children enjoyed singing along. It was a different and a heartwarming experience for all our kids.



Christmas Party and Fancy Dress Competition

A fancy dress is one of the most exciting things for young ones. This year we had a lot of children in town during Christmas so we decided to host a Fancy dress competition to entertain our children and women.

We had children dress up as different common people we meet in our day to day lives. We had little Father, Fisherman, Lawyer, Teacher, Christian, Krishna, Photographer, Foreigner, Paanwala and Bhajiwali. Each one had a small talk on who and why they chose to be the person they dressed as.

We had an amazing time that evening. The jokes and puzzles by women added to the festivities.



Dance for good

Shiamak Dawar's Victory Art Foundation students performed a dance program with SMILE's children and titled the event 'Dance for Good'.

They came along with a team of instructor, special children, young students and senior citizens. They delivered various performances and made the environment a fun filled one. Once done, they taught SMILE students a few steps and then everybody danced merrily together. It was a cherishing moment for our student.



Back to School

This is a very special program where we distribute stationery, books, bag and other things required to start the new academic year with a lot of zeal. We generally begin with a small discussion on how each one spent their holidays, a small talk on the programs for the coming year and our regulations like attendance and discipline. This was followed by ice-breaking games so that everyone left with not just goodies, but with a smile on their face.

We also declared the results of our Udaan children and explained the role of parents in shaping their futures. SMILE insists on active participation from the parents as well for helping the child achieve his/her goals.



Warm Welcome to Mrs. Anaxi Shah

Anaxi ma'am had returned back to office after a long holiday and hence people at SMILE decided to give her a flashback of what happened at SMILE during her absence. Women came about and shared their experience of the programs they had in her absence. Children too shared the same. Besides keeping the crowd entertained, our ladies played drums and lezim on Mrs. Anaxi's arrival followed by 'slab of jokes', 'mute acting' and 'tu tu main main' skit. This was our ladies first attempt at mute acting. All of them did exceptionally well. They also arranged two dance performances on the tunes of famous Bollywood songs.

Our children sang the Gayatri Mantra to welcome ma'am and they enacted acts from the illustrious Akbar-Birbal kathas. During the program; our guests Ms. Priya and Mr. Rajesh also shared details on Naturopathy and benefits of Tulsi drops.



Tak Dhina Dhin Dance Competition

Every year students from Rotary Club of H.R. College organize an Inter-NGO dance competition called Tak Dhina Dhin. For this program, students from the club train and choreograph dance movements for each NGO that is allotted to them. In all there were five NGO's that participated in this competition (Seva Sadan, Don Bosco, two teams of Salam Balak, Bal Mahila Kalyan and SMILE).

Our students secured the 3rd position for which they were rewarded. After the prize distribution ceremony the stage was set free for everybody present to come shake a leg. Everybody enjoyed the music and danced merrily. Such exposures for our children have helped them fight stage fright and develop a sense of confidence in facing the real world.



Walsingham House School Exhibition

Walsingham House School invited SMILE's children for their exhibition on "Facts of Mumbai" to their school. The exhibition covered everything from leaders, culture, technology, street food, festivals, peoples and many more. The exhibition also covered issues and the school's involvement in 'Swachhata Abhiyaan'.

Along with the live display; students also performed various programs. The entire event was organized very well and was totally nurtured by the students; right from comparing to enacting and the final delivery. Mumbai city's facts were showcased through dance and visual effects. They also performed using U. V. light effect. Our children had a great experience and learned an immense amount from them.



Hockey India (Dabang Mumbai VS Punjab Warriors)

Udaan children were invited by Star Sports Hockey India to watch Hockey match between ‘Punjab Warriors’ and ‘Dabang Mumbai’. This program was organized by Hockey Team under the title – Hockey Match Mumbai Ki Jaan.

After registration at the Mahindra Stadium, children and staff were treated with a light snack followed by fun filled activities like target game, shoot the balloon, tattoos, jumping on net, etc. They also played a mock hockey game.

Late evening by 6:45 PM children entered the pavilion and enjoyed the live hockey game, where they cheered for ‘Dabang Mumbai Team’ which eventually won by two goals. Children enjoyed the live experience and the aura of being at a stadium and watching a live match.

“Yes to Life” – Street Play on Drugs

Children from all strata of society today are being exposed to a growing drug use culture and the harmful effects of drugs are not being properly communicated. Peer pressure is one of the most common reasons for children to try drugs and get addicted to them. Anisa Tapia and Aman Nathani from B.D. Somani and Dhirubhai International school respectively as a part of their CSR activity put together a script, directed and produced a street play ‘YES TO LIFE!’ – ‘Meri Zindagi Mere Haath’ (My Life is in My Hands) and our children from the age group of 10-16 years enacted the play.

The play was a huge success. We gathered a large audience of children and parents at the amphitheatre of a local public park in Mumbai. The play was in Hindi with some English. The play made a huge impact on the crowd and a few school administrators requested that this play be enacted on their premises for their students. The play was filmed with a vision to offer it to various schools and colleges along with a presentation and thereby communicating the message to many more students and youth.



Sponsorship



Giving an opportunity to a child who cannot afford an education

Sponsorship is considered as financial aid to a child for his or her education.

At SMILE we take it many steps further by supporting the child not only financially but also mentor and help them with psychological, social and educational support. The child is selected for sponsorship on the basis of their academic result, family and financial background, their need and the parental interest. We help them further by providing the school fees, tuition classes, educational workshops, field trips and an overall exposure. This helps a child's overall development and shaping.

SMILE contributes 75% towards the child and the parent contributes a quarter. This ensures the parents involvement and dignity.

The sponsor receives an updated progress of the child at the end of the year. Regular parent and student interactions take place. All this ensures the growth of a child resulting them into being confident youth.

Till date SMILE has educated 3,000 children under it's care. 500 children have been educated through sponsorship program in Maharashtra and Gujarat. 120 have been educated under SMILE's Udaan project.

An effort to provide an equal opportunity to children from rural areas of India

SMILE conducted an extensive research and found out the various problems faced in rural schools and decided to assist and help develop some schools in rural areas. **These schools have no infrastructure and amenities and the parents do not understand the need of education for their children.**

Despite all these challenges our rural project commenced in 2008 with restructuring a Montessori and secondary school in Panwal village, district Ratnagiri with 158 students. We then developed a school in Wada, Thane district and also supported three schools in Gandhinagar, Gujarat. **SMILE has supported approximately 1,200 children from all these rural areas. This has been a proud achievement for us.** The children are well looked after and progressing well in their academics. SMILE provides the children's school fees, school bags, stationery and uniforms. We also plan the educational, sports and cultural programmes for the children, which further helps develop their overall personality.

SMILE has restructured a school in Thane at Vaki. A lot of amenities have been provided to the school like an auditorium, laboratory and a compound. This has provided a lot of motivation to the principal, faculty as well as the students resulting in good functionality of the school. The students are not only performing well in their academics but are also taking part in a lot of extra-curricular activities.

This year for grade 8th, 9th and 10th the admission rate in this school has increased from 160 students to 200 students. The students of this school had a very good opportunity last year to perform the 'Lezim' dance for the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge when they visited SMILE in 2016.

In Gandhinagar, Gujarat, SMILE has supported three schools. **SMILE has not only supported the school by helping with the school fees of the children but has also provided exposure to the children through extra-curricular activities and educational field visits. The children are also involved in cultural activities which has helped give an all rounded perspective of themselves.** SMILE is also helping the school with amenities as they have limited resources. SMILE ensures that parents are involved with the progress of their child's education and regular parent teacher meetings are conducted. The schools are progressing very well.

In Panwal village, Ratnagiri, SMILE has restructured a school and helped provide amenities, resources and guidance so that the school can progress well and the children can have a good education. Montessori admissions has increased by 30%.

Our aim is to extend our work to more rural areas of India. We feel there is a lot of potential in the children of these areas but a huge lack of facilities and resources.



Rural Programmes during 2016-2017



SMILE conducted a survey at Sanpada and Vaki both are villages in outer Mumbai. There was a terrible water problem. The scarcity of water was a huge issue in Thane and the villages were suffering. They were barely getting half a bucket of water which they had to use for all household purposes like drinking, washing clothes, washing vessels, bathing. The outcome of this could lead to health hazards and diseases. SMILE came to the rescue and sponsored two wells for these villages which gave the community a huge relief.

Mrs Anaxi Shah, our president visited Gujarat and conducted a survey in Navsari. She visited Navsari Dang project, Datta ashram, the blind school, Kanya Shala and Sasaya village. SMILE did a small project with Datta ashram and the blind school. Smile workers interacted with the children and faculty and distributed a medical kit to all the children.

A visit to the Panval village was made as SMILE helps a school there. A follow up of the Montessori and secondary school was conducted. Around 50 children are in the Montessori school. This is an important age for the children



to be brought under the informal education system. The secondary school was also running efficiently. Since it was the month of January, SMILE celebrated the Haldi Kum kum program and interacted with the children, school staff and the village Panchayat people.

A follow up was also made at the three Gujarat schools that SMILE is helping. The progress of the children and school amenities was assessed. The children seemed to be progressing and the school also provided educational visits, cultural programs and programs that involved the parents of these children. The children gained a lot from this exposure and there was a marked change in their personalities and confidence.



Montessori



Imparting values and education at an early age

According to “Mother Montessori”, who is the founder of the Montessori method of teaching that the vital age of 0-6 years is very important for the child where he or she learns through their five senses. This is the age when children have an absorbent mind and they absorb everything they see in and around their environment through touch and experience.

SMILE started its Montessori school in 1999, the only school in South Mumbai, for underprivileged children who otherwise never attend school till the age of 5 years.

Children at the SMILE Montessori school learn:

1. Group interaction using various media and exercises of daily life. This helps them to gain familiarization with the environment.
2. Working with sensorial material, which helps them in the development of sense organs and in the co-ordination of movement.
3. Alphabets, both phonetically and by tracing.
4. Languages using classified pictorial cards.
5. Mannerisms and value education.
6. Dancing, singing, art and other extra-curricular activities.
7. Importance of traditions and culture through the celebration of various festivals.

Additionally, parent-teacher meetings are conducted at regular intervals. The child's progress is closely monitored and counselling is provided as and when necessary.

After completing two years of Montessori, our children get admission in a primary school. During the end of the year we celebrate this as a Graduation. All the parents attend this programme and give us feedback on their child's experience and learnings at the Montessori school.

Montessori way of life

One of the most powerful tools for the social and economic progress of a country is good education, it brings with it equality among people. While privileged children receive quality education, most underprivileged children do not receive even the basic form of education.

We at SMILE catalyze the socio-economic change in India through the education of the underprivileged children. With this mission in mind, SMILE started the only Montessori school for the underprivileged children in South Mumbai. A Montessori curriculum focuses on key developmental milestones in children between the ages of 2-6 years. The entire teaching process of the school is based on the Montessori principle that, students should play an active role in their learning to apply concepts learned in the classroom. The school and its teachers are AMI recognized and certified.

Montessori is a system of education for young children that seeks to develop natural interests and activities rather than use formal teaching methods.

Montessori materials are divided into four categories:

- Practical life
- Sensorial
- Academics
- Cultural/Artistic Materials

The cornerstones of Montessori's Activities include:

- Education
- Exposure and Celebration
- Working with parents

Practical Life

The Practical Life activities provide real life experiences for children. The exercises in Practical Life provide purposeful activity, develop motor control and coordination, develop independence, concentration, and a sense of responsibility. Children have learnt sorting things, mat related activities, ponding, napkin folding,

pouring, mannerism and courtesy, fine motor skills such as opening and closing a bottle without spilling anything, plating, lacing, button frames and many such essential behaviors.

Sensorial


Children often feel they want to touch the things they see. Montessori sensorial activities are those which refine the five senses – touch, visual, hearing, taste and smell. Children are particularly open to developing their senses from ages 2-6, and it's important to give children at those ages as many sensorial experiences as possible. When we touch a certain thing, we are in a better position to associate with it. We have enhanced these skills through activities where the children relate things like pink pyramid, geometry cabinets, sorting different shapes, colored tablets, recognizing smooth and rough textures by touching boxes, cylindrical blocks, etc. All these activities aim at the sensory aspect of learning.

Mathematics

Mathematics is a part of daily life chores. Children need to know at the most know basics such as addition and subtraction at the lower level. Our little members at Montessori can now count up to hundred and recognize numbers from 0-9. They are also able to arrange these numbers in ascending order. Children are able to do number rods, spindle boxes, zero activities and other games related to Math.

Language

Children coming to our Montessori school often come from background where they communicate in either Hindi or Marathi. Our Montessori environment is made in such a way that all activities naturally gear them towards development of oral and written languages. Today our children know more than sixty poems and are able to converse in English. They know about the various animals, shapes, fruits, vegetables, flowers, birds, festivals, parts of the body, months of the year, days of the week, seasons etc.

Republic Day

SMILE Montessori had a Tricolor Morning on Republic Day. All the kids dressed up to represent different religions in India. They also dressed as farmers to represent India's 70% agricultural population. All our children sang patriotic songs and has a fun day. They played games like passing the parcel and musical chairs and each game had a prize. There was a prize for the best dressed child as well.



Makar Sankranti

As a traditional activity that happens at SMILE every year on the occasion of Makar Sankranti, we have our kids make their own little kites. Children love doing this activity and they come up with very colorful kites. SMILE then gives those kites that they can carry back home and can actually be flown. Children left school with lots of happiness and an eagerness to fly their newly owned kites.



Independence Day

The children dressed up as freedom fighters and proudly strutted with large smiles on their faces! Some were dressed as Mahatma Gandhi, Jawaharlal Nehru, Rani Laxmi Bai etc. For this event, our children sang patriotic Indian songs and our national anthem too.



Raksha Bandhan

We celebrate the bond of purity between a brother and a sister. The kids were first enlightened about the importance of the festival, "Rakhi". After having explained the values of this festival, we had our little girls do Aarti and tie Rakhis to the fellow boy classmates. In turn, the boys gave sweets/ chocolates to their new sister.



Ganesh Chaturthi

Every year for the children to understand the importance of celebrating their favorite elephant God; Lord Ganesha, we take them for a visit to Ganesh Pandal's.

All children carry some offerings to the Lord and come back happily with some learning and prasad. This year besides the Pandal's, we took them to one of our staff member's house where she had got Lord Ganesha's idol. The children offered garland, sweet, coconut and flowers. They sang the aarti and left with their stomach's full with wafers and some prasad.



Dussehra

Dussehra is marked by beautiful dances all across the country. This year we chose to celebrate the festival in the same tradition. Children were briefed upon the importance of this festival and what value it holds to the people of the country. They were shown the importance of victory of good over the evil. Post this, children danced to the rhythm and the beat of the traditional Garba music. The beat sunk into them and the steps came along naturally. Traditional Dussehra food: Jalebi and Fafda were distributed among the student. Each one went home with a smile on their face



Diwali

Popularly known as the "Festival of Lights", Diwali is celebrated at the Montessori school. The classrooms are decorated with lights, streamers and lamps. At SMILE Montessori children decorated the class with a Christmas tree and lights. They also dressed themselves as either Christmas tree, snowman and Santa Claus. They decorated the tree with a lot of ornaments and glittery baubles. Children were enlightened about the importance of this festival and the birth of Jesus Christ. This was followed by a couple of games and some snacks.

After celebrating Christmas at school, our children were invited by Headstart for further celebrations. Our kids enjoyed the couple of games played there, Santa coming and gifting each child a box of crayon and chocolates. The school too, provided them with juices and the children returned home merrily.



Field Trip to Police station and Post office

The Post Office is one of the most important and useful institutions maintained by our government. We visited the Malabar Hill Post Office which is in the vicinity of the school.

The Post Office was divided into many departments. Our children and teachers were welcomed warmly by the staff at the Post Office. They were taken around to see how letters are collected, segregated, stamped and then stored in pigeon holes for the postmen to collect. It was altogether a great learning experience especially in today's day and age of emails and Whatsapp.

Visit to Taraporewala Aquarium

The purpose of conducting the field trip is to help the children to explore about aquatic creatures. The students were fascinated to see the different kinds of colorful fish of different shapes and sizes on display there. The sea water section has turtles, sea horses, yellow frogs, etc. Whereas the tropical section has fish like angel fish, sword tail fish, red dragon flower horn fish. The view of the different species of fish inside the Aquarium was magnificent. After observing the aquarium children relaxed and had their snacks. All in all, it was a very exciting day for Flamingo Kids.



Working with Parents

Kids do better in school when parents are involved in their academic lives. Attending parent-teacher meetings is a way to be involved and help your child succeed. To ensure that their children are doing well, we at Montessori conduct quarterly meetings to let them know the progress of their little ones. We discuss a child's progress at school and find solutions to academic or behavioral problems one to one with the child's parents. We mainly keep our focus on a child's strength and try to work upon his weakness.

For the first meeting before the academic year begins, we orient our parents to what the kids will be doing during the year. Then follows the follow up meetings and final meeting is the Graduation Ceremony for the kids.



Montessori Graduation Ceremony

The Graduation ceremony is conducted every year to felicitate the toddlers graduate to primary school. This gets them ready for their new phase of school life.

This year we kick started the ceremony with a few games and a fancy dress competition. The kids had a small round of fancy dress followed by a game called "Ask and Get". The children were asked to get a few things from their parents; whoever did it first, won the game. Followed by the game was the Graduation Ceremony.

The kids were feeling happy after getting graduation hats and certificates of graduation. This was an important day in the lives of the little graduates and an emotional one for their parents. Parents were jubilant as they watched their budding stars with pride; wearing graduate caps, walking on stage with confidence to happily receiving their certificates. It was indeed a great pleasure to witness the lovely young students reach the first milestone in their academic journey.

Empowering our women to be financially independent

Project Utkarsh started when we realised that it is very important to work with the parents of our children especially the mothers to ensure a well-rounded growth.

Our objective was to build a good child-parent relationship and the importance of the education. We also worked with the mothers because we believe that bringing women from the underprivileged world into the main stream of society by giving them confidence and an identity of their own is very important.

SMILE conducts educational workshops, health awareness, expert lectures and entertainment to groom their personality and provide them an exposure to the outside world. Project Utkarsh also aims at training women who are talented and eager to learn skills like mehendi, beauty courses, cooking, arts and crafts and many more. After learning these skills, 'The Income Generation Project' of SMILE helps these women to sell products that they learned to make and therefore this gives them a sustainable income.

The women develop leadership skills and they gain a lot of confidence. Besides this, we also provide counselling and support to our women.

Dermatoglyphics Multiple Intelligence Test



A method used to help hone inborn intelligence and talent in a human

In today's world of competition, it has become a challenge for children to decide and choose the career of their choice based on their intelligence, talent and preference. It becomes all the more difficult for the underprivileged ones because they come from an environment where the parents lack knowledge, do not have enough resources and schools are government aided with no exposure to advanced fields.

These children are bright and lack opportunity and career guidance because of which they cannot come at par with the other children.

Keeping the core mission of SMILE of improving the lives of children, SMILE conducted the DMIT (Dermatoglyphics Multiple Intelligence Test). This test is based on the research

made by Dr. Harold Cummin's study of Dermatoglyphics and Dr. Howard Gardner's study of Multiple Intelligence.

DMIT is the study of fingerprints. It is based on the fact that an individual's finger prints are unique just like their DNA. Fingerprints start developing when a baby is 13 weeks old. The core belief is that fingerprints can decode brain's hidden talent. They provide a plethora of information about one's 5 lobes of the brain. DMIT testing is a collective analysis of Dermatoglyphics Data and Evaluation of the same along with Multiple Intelligence.

Many of our children have gained from the DMIT testing. It has given them a good direction and this guidance through DMIT has benefitted many of our SMILE children.

Our Success Stories

Our journey has crossed two decades. The growth of SMILE and helping educate more children each year is due to your involvement and contribution.

We are working with a lot of children who have dreams and the ability to achieve them. Today, we have close to 50 children in schools and 60 going to college. There are students who are pursuing engineering, medicine, C.A., legal studies and more.

Our children and a mother have shared their story and changes that occurred in their lives after becoming a member of the SMILE family.

With the encouragement SMILE provided she had the courage to move on.

Snehal now works in three homes as a cook and earns INR 7000.00. She also takes orders for theplas, tacos, puris and many more items through SMILE and earns approximately INR 1000.00. This earning of hers is transferred by SMILE into Snehal's bank account. Both her daughter's help her in her business and with household duties. Snehal could not imagine that she could pick up the pieces of her life after the tragedy that struck her. She has been single handedly supporting her family and very soon her daughters will finish their education and be a support to her. Snehal is a confident and happy woman who has learned a lot through the hard times in her life.

Sujeet Bhagat

Sujeet Bhagat joined SMILE when he was in the 7th standard. He has always been a bright child but shy by nature. Someone with an inclination and a deep interest in academics, his results are a proof of his intelligence.

Sujeet had always dreamt of helping the needy and doing something for them. To achieve this dream he thought of taking medicine as his career path and appeared for his medical entrance exams. He is currently pursuing BDS (Bachelor in Dental Studies) from one of the most reputed colleges in Maharashtra; The Nair Dental College. 
